

he much awaited Digitizing India Awards 2016 started off on a musical note this year at the Taj Palace Hotel in New Delhi with a performance by Dr Prakash Sontakke and Gerard Machado, the mellifluent duo who make up the 'Kalyani Blues', which brought on an atmosphere of grandeur to the event. IT and Communications Minister Ravi Shankar Prasad flagged off the Digital India journey in April and had emphasized on three key points-creating a dig-ital environment, focusing on digital delivery and working towards digital empowerment. These indeed were the key themes in the event as Chief Guest and Minister of Urban Development Venkaiah Naidu and Guest of Honour and Chief Minister of Andhra Pradesh N Chandrababu Naidu, graced the digite-rati-studded Darbar Hall in person and over satellite, respectively. The categories were a tight set, which comprised a total of 10 awards up for grabs, excluding the special categories this year.


